Tostan, a US501(c)(3) with headquarters in Dakar, Senegal and an international office in Washington, DC, is a rapidly expanding nongovernmental organization dedicated to community-led development in Africa.

Tostan's mission is to empower African communities to bring about sustainable development and positive social transformation based on respect for human rights through the involvement of the most important stakeholders: the African communities themselves.

Since 1991, Tostan has brought its holistic 30-month Community Empowerment Program (CEP) to over 3,000 communities in ten African countries. As a result, over 4,000 communities have abandoned female genital cutting (FGC) thus far and many more will join them in the years to come. Of the aforementioned communities, over 90% have also abandoned child/forced marriage after completing the CEP or exchanging knowledge with communities that participated to the program.



Fast Facts about Tostan

- Tostan means “breakthrough” in Wolof, the most widely-spoken national language in Senegal.
- The World Health Organization, UNICEF, Population Council, and many others recommend Tostan’s program as a “best practice” for helping communities abandon harmful traditional practices (e.g. female genital cutting, child/forced marriage).
- Tostan employs over 200 full-time staff and on average works with more than 900 Africa volunteer facilitators. **Over 99% of Tostan’s staff is African.**
- Tostan has implemented its program in more than **3000 villages** in Burkina Faso, Djibouti, The Gambia, Guinea, Guinea Bissau, Mali, Mauritania, Senegal, Somalia, and Sudan.
- Recognition for Tostan’s program and staff includes the **Anna Lindh Award for Human Rights** (2005), the **UNESCO King Sejong Literacy Prize** (2007), and the **Conrad N. Hilton Humanitarian Prize** (2007).

Commitment

Interns commit to work with the DC team for a minimum of three months (part-time for a minimum of 15 hours/week, or full-time). Past interns have found longer commitments to help them become fully productive and more independent members of our team while providing a certain level of continuity for the projects with which they are involved. A longer commitment also allows our interns to participate in some of the many events that are regularly held in Washington, DC. These events are great learning experiences and networking opportunities. If you intend to intern for credit, please mention it in your statement of purpose.
